## ONE WOMAN'S DREAM CREATED A HUB FOR ALL CROWN HEIGHTS MOTHERS

Being a mother in a community full of thousands of women with children can, ironically, be a very isolating experience. One woman from Crown Heights took the onus upon herself to do something about it.

For years, women raising children in Crown Heights were surrounded by thousands of other mothers just like them, but many felt like they were at it alone.

For an average mother in Crown Heights, there is a lot of time she is raising her children on her own. Things like the long months of cold weather and the absence of public child-friendly spaces to go to

locally, really create a culture of isolation and sometimes loneliness for many Crown Heights mothers.

The experience of motherhood, is an exhilarating, intense, exhausting, and mainly uninterrupted one, for a large chunk of years for many women. Having a strong support system from the people who are intimately aware of what they're going through, is a key factor in the happiness and success of their parenting.

Over the years, there were resources slowly being offered, and organizations being created to support the mothers of Crown Heights, but there was still no cohesive place to access all that was available. Mainly, there was no physical space to go to and celebrate the joys and challenges of motherhood.

When Mrs. **Mushka Leiter** saw that there was no virtual place to access the various resources available to women, she created the website **MothersOfCrownHeights.org**. The website began as a compilation of everything available to the mothers in Crown Heights, from when a woman was expecting through birth and postpartum.

The website has lists of doctor referrals, phone numbers to any type of health practitioner a family might need, resources for those struggling with mental health issues, *gemachs* for

everything- from bris pillows to noise cancelling headphones, indoor play places all over Brooklyn, and tons of help for mothers before and after giving birth.

"The website was getting a thousand views a month, and I kept hearing from grateful mothers how helpful it was," shares Mrs. Leiter. "The more the website grew, and the more I heard directly from the women, the more keenly I felt how sorely the community was lacking a physical space for mothers to gather and commune in."

Hence, the dream of Miriam's Motherhood Center came into being three years ago. It would be a place for mothers to find their village. There would be a playroom, there would be educational courses and movement classes, and most of all, there would be friendship.

"The initial planning stage began two years ago. It would be a place for mothers to find their village. There would be a playroom, there would be educational courses and movement classes, and most of all, there would be community," Mrs. Leiter said.

"The initial planning stage began three years ago. My husband and I spent over a year finding the right space, renovating, and fundraising to open the center," she said. "We named it after my grandmother, Mrs. **Miriam Friedman**, of blessed memory, who had recently passed away and was a proud mother to many wonderful children role model to so many."

Two short years ago, the center opened to the public. It has a beautiful state-of-the-art playroom for mothers who can spend time there meeting others and bring their young children four and under to play in. The room is open every day, all day, and is exclusively for children who come with their mothers.

**Devorah Tamir**, a mother from Crown Heights, began frequenting the center and found in it a haven.

"I want to thank you for all you do at Miriam's Motherhood Center," she said. "It's been the missing piece in my life since becoming a mother, and I'm truly grateful to have this space and the opportunities that come with it.

Another integral part of the program is the extensive education it provides to women about every stage of parenthood. There are courses on Taharas Hamishpacha, monthly childbirth education classes, postpartum support groups, CPR refresher classes, and *shiurim* on various Torah subjects.

"We also offer Mommy & Me, and Music & Movement weekly events where women can come with their infants and toddlers and spend an enjoyable and relaxing time in the company of other adults. The kids have playmates, the mothers have a group of peers at the same stage as they are, and everyone has a really nice time," says Mrs. Leiter.

Aside for the playroom, the center is equipped with a studio that hosts multiple exercise classes. The classes offer babysitting on site for the women attending and range from Pilates, to core strengthening, to yoga classes.

### WE NEED A FRANK TALK ABOUT TZNIUS AND BEARDS

Article by Rabbi Gershon Avtzon: When I told a few of my close friends of my Hakhel Hachlata to write monthly Op-Eds on Chinuch-related issues, I was warned that there are certain topics that one must stay away from. The two main topics were Tznius for girls and women and beards for boys and men.

As we begin preparing for Rosh Hashana, the time for reaccepting upon ourselves the kingship of Hashem, it is appropriate

to speak about two very important and sensitive topics: Tznius and Beards.

Being open and transparent: When I told a few of my close friends and family members of my Hakhel Hachlata/resolution, to write monthly Op-Eds on Chinuch-related issues, I was warned that there are certain topics that one must stay away from and they automatically turn off the reader as they already have formed a strong emotional opinion on the matter. The two main topics were "Tznius" for girls and women and "beards" for boys and men.

Throughout the year I have listened to this sage advice but as we are finishing this special Hakhel year, I feel it appropriate to share an important Chinuch perspective on the abovementioned topics. *To be clear: I am not:* 1) writing to vent my personal frustration with the lowering standards in our communities 2) giving a halacha (or mussar) shiur 3) pointing fingers at individuals or institutions. I am writing to share a Chinuch approach to these, and other important halachos and minhagim, that our children may find initially burdensome or restricting.

In my twenty years in Chinuch, I have observed the following pattern. There are certain families that have (generally) managed to instill higher standards in their children in specific areas, even if the children (or families from where they come from) were "regular" in their general standards of Chassidhkeit and Yiras Shamayim. These standards were adhered to even though they were difficult and also demanded a certain level of sacrifice.

I will share two examples: 1) There is one family that is very careful about eating only "split-chicken" and members of this family would have to forgo many meals in Yeshiva that served non-split chicken. 2) I have seen descendants of the "Shalah Hakadosh" who have given up on eating meals where "turkey" was served.

[There are many examples that I can bring. I bring examples of eating, as this area is very important to a Mesivta-age bochur. Many are away from home and this is the only food that they get to eat.]

In the beginning, I wondered how these families were able to instill these values into their children to the extent that even when the children leave their parents' sight and care they hold on to these (seemingly) "chumros".

After observing, and asking the talmidim themselves, the picture became crystal clear: These stringencies were presented to, and instilled in, the children a strong sense of honor and pride from the very beginning. They were explained that they are from a special family and that these stringencies are a badge of honor for their special family. Presented in such a way, the children in these families wanted to keep wearing and identifying with, this special badge of honor.

In practical terms: As parents and *machanchim*, we must be aware that there are certain values that we want to instill in our children that will make them look and act different from those which are around them. The way to do that is, not by creating the illusion that it is easy – rather, by constantly (and from a young age) speaking about how special we (as Yidden and Chassidim) are and the pride of wearing these badges of honor.

I once spoke to a group of girls who had difficulties with Tznius. I presented the following scenario: Imagine you walked into the Beis Hamikdash and saw all the Kohanim wearing four garments and one Kohein wearing eight. Would you feel bad for the one that is stuck wearing eight (as opposed to four)? Do you think the person wearing eight garments feels self-conscious or restricted by his extra external garments? They all looked at me and answered: "Of course not! The one wearing eight is the Kohein Gadol and people would risk their lives (knowing that they would have to enter the Kodesh Kadashim) just for the honor of being a Kohein Gadol!

I smiled and looked at each of those girls and explained to them that as a "Bas Yisroel and Bas Chabad", they are also a Kohein Gadol and the "extra garments" (tznius) that Hashem wants them to wear is an expression of their unique status and position in this world. It had a tremendous effect on those girls.

[On the topic of Tznius, and close to Tishrei, I would like to bring up the following question that I have been wondering: If you daven in 770 on Yom Tov, you will observe the pre (and post) Birchas Kohanim rush in which many frum and Chassidishe couples meet up right outside 770 to ensure that their kids are under the Tallis for Brichas Kohanim. It creates a very sticky tznius situation for all those people (especially bochurim) who are entering or exiting the shul. Is it the right thing and appropriate? I leave the question to each couple to think about and discuss with their Rav.]

The same approach applies to instilling in our boys the importance and pride in always having a full beard: Some have taken the approach to start teaching the boys the many poskim that speak of the severity of the *issur* of trimming or shaving. While I fully agree that

boys should be aware of the Halachik severity and stringency of this important issue, and that having a full beard is not a chumara but rather a din, this approach should be secondary. The primary approach needs to be speaking about the beauty of being a yid and Chassid – and looking like one – and how Chassidim were literally Moser nefesh to have a full beard.

Many years ago, in 5758, I spent a shabbos at the Chabad@Flamingo (Toronto) which is directed by Rabbi and Mrs. **Mendel Kaplan**, It was a frosty shabbao morning and we walked to Chabad Gate (half-hour) to go to the Mikva before Davening. During our walk, Rabbi Mendel Kaplan shared the following: Some of his Balebatim ask him why he walks such a distance – in the freezing weather – just to go to the Mikva. He does not answer them what is says is sefarim about Mikva, rather answers the following: "If chassidim in Russia broke ice to go to the Mikva, I could and should walk the half hour in a warm coat to go to a nice and warm indoor Mikvah."

It is only after we say "Ata Beachrtanu mekol Ha'amim – Hashem has chosen us from all the nations" that we continue to say "Vikitashtanu B'mitzvosecha – you sanctified us with your Mitzvos". Instilling a true Geon Yaakov in being a Yid and Chassid of the Rebbe – and then explaining what badges of honor and appropriate actions and behaviors come along with that – is the only way that the values we work so hard to engrain and instill in our children and talmidim will be long lasting and meaningful.

### **BRINGING DOWN GIRLS FOR SHLICHUS? HERE ARE FIVE TIPS**

After spending her own time on shlichus, a post-seminary girl writes five tips for shluchim who are looking to hire girls for the upcoming year, and for the girls they hire.

With the new year just ahead, many are thinking of how to make this year a meaningful and rich experience. One post-seminary girl who returned from working for shluchim, put together a list of tips for shluchim who are hiring girls to know how best to treat them.

**One**: **Make a proper contract**. Before going, make a contract and appoint an

intermediary that you both trust, to be available if a situation arises where one party needs an advocate. The contract should contain the agreement regarding the responsibilities of the girl being brought down, her payment, living accommodations, and the standards of yiddishkeit and chassidishkeit you expect her to adhere to. The contract should be agreed upon and signed by both parties, and can be adjusted if necessary.

If there are additional things that need to be done at a certain time, you can ask the girls for help but should always leave them a respectful amount of space and not expect them to say yes or always be available.

Crushing and overloading girls with extra work makes it difficult for them to do the actual job on the contract. If you sees there is an overload of work that needs to be done, it is appropriate to hire more people, not just dump it on the teachers and shluchos who come because they are there already.

**Two: Make them feel welcome and appreciated.** These girls are young and it is likely their first experience having a job; treat them properly and they will respond in kind. The shlucha can make sure to check in on them periodically and see how they are acclimating to the new environment, and make sure they have everything they need.

Small gestures of warmth and kindness go a long way. Things like setting up their apartment with food before they arrive, giving them time to settle in before starting them

working, and giving small gifts for Chanukah, or after big events where they worked really hard, makes them feel seen and appreciated.

**Three:** Have in-person meetings. The best way to clearly plan out what needs to be done is in person. Set aside a set time to meet and go over the upcoming schedule of events. Phone calls and texts are distracting, especially when they are conducted in the middle of taking care of multiple other things at the same time,

Lots of miscommunications and dysfunctions can be avoided with proper meetings and clear communication. When the girls know what's happening in advance, they know what to expect, what they need to do, and can do their job properly.

**Four: Be sensitive and appropriate.** You are dealing with young women. Be mindful of the relationship the girls are expected to have with the shliach and the shlucha. Some things will make girls uncomfortable, and having to deal closely with the Rabbi can also be inappropriate in certain circumstances. Be in touch with a mashpia regarding the individual questions you may have regarding your particular situation.

**Five: Invest in your future.** Lastly, the way you treat your girls this year is an investment in the quality of girls that will be willing to come the next year and every year into the future. Girls share their experiences with friends and the best way to ensure you keep having the great staff that you want, is by treating the ones you have now properly and with respect.

Build a reputation as a fair, kind, and thoughtful employer and girls will be calling you up to come, rather then you having to frantically search each year.

### THE BUDGET FOR YESHIVAS TOMCHEI TMIMIM...IN 1938

In November of 1938, a short few months before the outbreak of WWII, the Rashag sent an urgent appeal in English to America asking for support of the Yeshiva Tomchei Tmimim network in Poland.

How much did it cost to run a Yeshiva in 1938?

Among the archives of R' **Meir Harlig**, which are being publicized following his passing, are two fascinating letters that give a glimpse into the world of Yeshivas Tomchei Tmimim prior, and during, World War II.

The letters, written in English, were sent by the Rashag, son-in-law of the Frierdiker Rebbe, to supporters and friends in the USA. Rashag held the title of *menahel* of the Yeshiva, or as translated on the letterhead 'Honorary President of the Executive Committee.'

Written in November of 1938, the appeals were sent just a few brief months before the Nazi's invasion of Poland. Yet, antisemitism was already on the rise, and the letter noted the "rapid deterioration of the Jewish position in Europe."

The second page details the exact expenses of the yeshiva for the proceeding year of 5698 (Sep. 1937 to Sep. 1938), detailing expenses and income in Polish Zloty. The total expenses for the year were 160,792.18 Zloty, which at an exchange rate of 5.31 zl to \$1 USD, would translate into \$30,281.01 American Dollars. Adjusted for inflation, \$30,281.01 in 1938 is equal to \$641,950.92 in 2023.

The budget details the expenses for the soup kitchen (66,375 zl - \$12,500 USD), for clothing and shoes for the bochurim (7,225.80 zl - \$1,360.79 USD), books (761.30 zl - \$143.37 USD), staff and teachers (26,500 zl - 4990.58 USD) and more.

Income came in the form of donations from the USA (38,675.35 zl – \$7283.49 USD), donations from England (14,184.85 zl – \$2671.34 USD), *meshulachim* abroad (19,580.45 zl – \$3738.31 USD), the Frierdiker Rebbe's fund, and other donations, totaling 141,115.50 Zloty, or \$26,575.42 USD.

The remaining deficit was 19,676.68 Zloty, or \$3705.58 USD.

Below is reproduced the full text of the letter sent to supporters, which gives a small glimpse at those years when Torah study flourished and Yeshivas Tomchei Tmimim was a beacon of light, which continued to shine, through its students, long after the Nazis forced it to flee overseas.

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A Brief Survey of the Yeshivoth "Tomche-Tmimim", Lubavitz.

The famous Yeshivah "Tomche-Tmimim" was founded in Lubavitz (Russia) over 40 years ago (in 1897), by the celebrated late Grand Rabbi Shalom Dovber Schneersohn. The yeshivah grew and developed, and at the outbreak of the war it numbered 400 students on its rolls. Even during the war the Yeshivah maintained its existence in the face of the greatest difficulties and obstacles. The Bolshevik regime and the persecution of the "Yevsektzia" dealt a cruel blow to the Yeshiva, yet it continued to keep the torch of the Torah alight in one town or another in Russia. With utter self-sacrifice and in danger of his life, the present Lubavitz Grand Rabbi Joseph Isaac Schneersohn, son of the founder, exerted every effort to maintain, guide and support the Yeshivah during its exile in those troubled days.

In 1919 the Yeshivah "Tomche-Tmimim" was removed to Warsaw. Students from all parts of Poland ... to Warsaw enter this famous Yeshivah. In 1936, the greater part of the Yeshiva was finally moved to Otwock ... health resort in the neighborhood of the ... now occupies large and fitting promises, in very healthy surroundings. In such circumstances, and under the constant beneficent influence of Rabbi Schneersohn, the morale and progress of the students has attained the highest degree. At present the central Yeshivah in Otwock has branches in the following cities: Warsaw, Wilno, Lodz, Chelm, Kelushin, Lontschne and Patshinow, and the total number of students in the Yeshivoth "Tomche Tmimin exceeds 700. Upon completion of the course of study in the branch Yeshivoth and satisfactory passing of the final exams, the graduates are admitted to the Central Yeshivah in Otwock, where they continue their studies and research, and obtain Rabbinic Diplomas.

<u>The students are fully provided with board, accommodation and clothing</u> from the funds of the Yeshivoth. The Central Yeshivah also endeavours to secure for them appropriate posts on their final graduation.

The excellent system and organisation of the Yeshivoth "Tomche Tmimim" has won the acknowledgment and admiration of the Jewish Cultural World, and the greatest and most prominent Rabbis and laymen have paid the highest tributes to the Yeshivah and its splendid students. Many leader and learned laymen in Jewish communities the world over, have been student in the Yeshivoth "Tomche-Tmimim".

Th financial burden of the Yeshivoth is considerable. The annual budget of 1937 amounted to 144,358.77 zloty (over \$27,000), which: has already ben surpassed to-date, owing to the increased number of students and higher price level. The Yeshivoth are entirely dependent

upon voluntary contributions and subscriptions. Unfortunately, this source of income has diminished considerably in consequence of the general depression and particularly as a result of the rapid deterioration of the Jewish position in Europe, and the Yeshivoth are now faced with the most severe economic crisis, threatening their very existence.

The Executive Committee ... desperate struggle in order to maintain the high cultural ... standard of the Yeshivoth, and are compelled to ... those to whom the cause of the Torah and of hundreds of its most ardent students is near and dear to their hearts – PLEASE HELP!

The Executive Committee of the Yeshivoth "Tomche-Tmimim" are confident that Jewish organisations and private sympathisers will rally to their support, and thus prevent the destruction of these Holy Temples.

### WHERE ARE OUR COMMUNITY'S LEADERS?

"Where are our leaders?" many people ask. But as the people, we should primarily ask a different question: "Where are the followers?" There are many qualified *Rabbanim* and *mashpiim* to lead us with the Torah as their guide, the question is if we are willing to follow.

In this week's *Pirkei Avos* we read the following episode:

Said Rabbi Yossei the son of Kisma: Once, I was traveling and I encountered a man. He

greeted me and I returned his greetings. Said he to me: "Rabbi, where are you from?" Said I to him: "From a great city of sages and scholars." Said he to me: "Rabbi, would you like to dwell with us in our place? I will give you a million dinars of gold, precious stones, and pearls." Said I to him: "If you were to give me all the silver, gold, precious stones, and pearls in the world, I would not dwell anywhere but in a place of Torah."

Why didn't Rabbi Yossei accept the proposal and make it his mission to transform this place into a place of Torah?!

There are certainly many explanations to this but I'd like to share one which my father *a*"h gave. [My father's birthday is this coming week and the bar mitzvah of my son, who is named for my father, is today.]

Notice, taught my father, that the man offered Rabbi Yossei to "dwell with us in our place." He and his community wanted a rabbi who would conform to the place. They wanted an American-style rabbi, one who answers to a board and seeks to please his members by following their whims instead of leading them according to the Torah.

To this, Rabbi Yossei responded: I will only agree to lead a community that is willing to become a *makom Torah*, a place led by Torah.

In this week's *sedra* we have the *mitzvah* to appoint a king. When the Yidden asked Shmuel HaNavi to appoint a king for them he was displeased. Did he not recognize that this was a *mitzvah*?

The Kli Yakar explains that the answer lies in a nuance. The *mitzvah* is to "set a king over you" but they demanded, "give us a king." The purpose of a king is to be above the Yidden, to lead them and instill the fear of Heaven upon them. This, they did not want. They wanted a king who'd be devoted to them and answer to their needs and wants. And the Kli Yakar adds: "As is the custom to these lands that they accept a *rav* for a certain period of time so that he won't be revered, on the contrary; he will be afraid of his community and will therefore be forced to placate and flatter them."

The Rebbe once wrote to Rabbi Shlomo Zalman Hecht: The painful reality is that the community members push and pressure their rabbi, and the rabbi is afraid to take a stance out of fear that he may turn people away from Torah, so he concedes and makes compromises in *Yiddishkeit.*[1]

"Where are our leaders?" many people ask.

But as the people, we should primarily ask a different question: Where are the followers?

There are many qualified *Rabbanim* and *mashpiim* to lead us with the Torah as their guide, the question is if we are willing to follow.

Am I looking for a rabbi who'll entertain me in *shul*, or one who'll enlighten me with the truth? Do I have the humility to accept his guidance even when it conflicts with my way of thinking?

The *mishneh* says עשה לך רב, assume for yourself a master. *Meforshim* explain that the word עשה also means to force. We must accept our *rav* even when it's difficult.

However, the word עשה can also be translated literally as "make for yourself a master" and be interpreted facetiously to mean that we should make our own master, custom-design him to suit our desires and not lead us beyond our comfort zone. And we'll fool ourselves into thinking that we're actually fulfilling the directive of the *mishneh*.

Having a true leader to follow is a gift, and to a large degree it's up to us whether or not to utilize this gift.

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### THE RAILROAD MAGNATE WHO WAS THE REBBE'S AMBASSADOR

A wealthy chossid who lived in the capital city of Petersburg, R. Shmuel Michel Treinin was a supporter and activist for the Rebbe Rashab. But when he proudly showed the Rebbe his huge factory, the Rebbe reminded him whose davening brought it.

Reb Shmuel Michel Treinin was a chossid of the Rebbe Maharash and the Rebbe Rashab. He lived in Petersburg and was very rich. He was very involved in communal matters on behalf of the *Yidden* in Russia and assisted the Rebbe Rashab and the Frierdiker Rebbe in this realm. He was a smart man with strong beliefs, and he was proud of being a chossid, even

when among unreligious, well-to-do people. If someone commented negatively about *Yidden*, he knew how to respond.

Once when visiting the Rebbe Rashab in Lubavitch, the Rebbe told him to give ten thousand rubles for communal matters. Reb Shmuel Michel, however, was hesitant and refrained from doing so.

Sometime later, he was riding in his carriage in the streets of Petersburg, when suddenly the Czar's carriage came towards them. His driver, not knowing who it was, did not move aside, causing disrespect to the Czar. Reb Shmuel Michel was fined ten thousand rubles. He bemoaned, "These are the ten-thousand ruble I refrained from giving to the Rebbe..."

Reb Shmuel Michel had the rights to building the tracks for the trains near Petersburg. He had a huge factory for this task with thousands of employees. Once when the Rebbe Rashab visited Petersburg, Reb Shmuel Michel asked him to come tour his factory. At the end when the Rebbe was ready to leave, Reb Shmuel Michel asked, "Rebbe, what do you think about the factory?" The Rebbe responded, "How do you think you got all this? It's because in Lubavitch during the *davening* on Rosh Hashana you are thought about."

R' Shmuel Michel was a very wealthy chossid and was very organized and put together by nature. He had dealings with numerous important government officials, and was always dressed immaculately.

Once, the celebrated chossid R' Michoel der Alter came to Petersburg for the purpose of getting a bochur freed from the draft. He came to R' Shmuel Michel for assistance, and R' Shmuel Michel was accompanying him to visit some important officers who would perhaps be able to help their cause.

R' Michoel went around the streets of Petersburg the same way that he did in Lubavitch; he didn't pay any special attention to his attire. Furthermore, at the time of the story R' Michoel was apparently before davening, and wasn't even buttoned up.

R' Shmuel Michel was walking alongside R' Michoel in the street, and feeling distinctly uncomfortable. Here he was, the respected businessman who everyone knew and held in such high esteem, and he was being escorted by what looked like a tramp! Of course he wouldn't say anything to R' Michoel, who he was in awe of, but every time one of his acquaintances passed by them he felt like running away and hiding.

Finally, he could not contain himself, and a long sigh burst out of his mouth. Startled, R' Michoel asked him if everything was alright. R' Shmuel Michoel tried very respectfully to suggest to R' Michoel that at least when walking in the streets of Petersburg he could make himself more presentable.

When R' Michoel heard that this was what was troubling his colleague, he turned to him reproachfully and exclaimed:

"Gevald, R' Shmuel Michel, in vos ihr ligt?!!" Gevald, R' Shmuel Michel, is this what your mind is on?!

### 770 ANNOUNCES NEW RULES ON TISHREI SEAT ASSIGNMENTS

With Rosh Hashana right around the corner, the *Gabboim* of Congregation Lubavitch at 770 Eastern Parkway have announced new rules regarding seat assignments for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

With Rosh Hashana right around the corner, the *Gabboim* of Congregation Lubavitch at 770 Eastern Parkway have announced new rules regarding seat

assignments for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Under the new rules, only a person who **paid** for a seat in the previous year will retain the right to repurchase it for the upcoming year. There will be no more *chazakas* over seats.

In past years, oftentimes, people with the original right to the seat would resell it to someone else. Going forward the seat will exclusively display the buyer's name, and you will not be allowed to switch it.

The Gabboim are stressing that each seat is intended for a single individual. Should multiple people be found using the same seat, it will result in the forfeiture of the right to repurchase it in the future.

The new rules come after another major change that is due to rising expenses. Going forward, everyone will be required to pay full price, as **they will no longer offer** any discounts on seats for Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur.

See the full list of regulations below.

#### Shul Regulations Regarding Seat Assignments for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur

- 1) The Gaboim will announce seat prices on or around Rosh Chodesh Elul.
- 2) Anyone who bought a seat in the previous year retains the right to repurchase it for the upcoming year. No additional rights will be granted.
- 3) Failure to contact the shul regarding the seat by Motzei Shabbos Slichos will result in forfeiture of the right to repurchase it. The Shul is not obliged to initiate contact with the owner, and no exceptions will be made.
- 4) Payment should be made from Rosh Rosh Chodesh Elul until the following 15th of Av. The payment responsibility rests with the owner of the seat. In the event of

incomplete payment, the owner will forfeit their right to the seat.

- 5) Unsettled debts, regardless of their nature, to the Shul are grounds for seat expropriation.
- 6) Excessive effort in collecting payment for the seat is grounds for seat expropriation.
- 7) The seat will exclusively display the buyer's name, with no other names appearing. The buyer is the legitimate owner of the seat and holds the complete right to renew the seat purchase for the following year.
- 8) Any modification or addition to the name on the label will result in an additional charge of \$50. In cases where there are two names on the label, the first name listed will have exclusive rights to purchase the seat for the following year.
- 9) The seat is intended for a single individual. Should multiple people be found using the same seat, it will result in the forfeiture of the right to repurchase it in the future.
- 10) The right to the seat is for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur tefillos only.
- 11) The payment for the seat is regarded as "Shul membership fee" for the forthcoming year.
- 12) The seats are the property of the Shul, and the Shul possesses the authority to make decisions regarding seat assignments, in accordance with Halacha, as determined by the Beis Din of Crown Heights. In any dispute, the Shul maintains the Halachic upper hand.

# NEW SHLICHUS WITH 11 KIDS: GREENBERG FAMILY'S COURAGEOUS MOVE

After building an entire community from scratch, raising eleven children, and even purchasing a building, the shluchim to Pudong, China were faced with their community's mass exodus. Instead of giving up, they are moving on to a new shlichus.

Starting a new shlichus is always a challenge. Starting a new shlichus with 11 kids? Unprecedented. But that's exactly what Rabbi **Avraham** and **Nechomi Greenberg**, are setting out to do.

17 years ago, the Greenbergs were sent to Pudong, Shanghai, China where they co-founded a Chabad Jewish center, and spread the light of Judaism for the hundreds of Jews living and visiting there.

The last three years in China were unbelievably challenging. Most foreigners left the Shanghai and Pudong area, and the few local Jews who remained were completely cut off from the wider world. For about six months the Greenberg's themselves faced quarantine without the possibility of leaving their house.

Even during those extremely difficult times they persevered, to keep the embers of Judaism in Shanghai alive. Using every tool at their disposal, they remarkably managed to lead minyanim, Torah classes, Bar Mitzvah celebrations and children's activities.

Even during the great lockdown, when the 28 million residents of Shanghai were locked in their homes for long months, and transportation and delivery services were shut down, the Greenberg's made sure that every Jew in Shanghai had Matzah for Pesach.

Now, after the dust has settled from the corona storm, it has become clear that 90 percent of their community in Shanghai has not returned to the city, and there are only a few families remaining in Pudong.

In light of the situation, they have decided to embark on a new journey to Phuket, Thailand where they together with their 11 children to establish will establish a new Chabad house for the developing local community there.

When asked about the difficulty of leaving a home and community he toiled to build for the last seventeen years, and moving with grown children and a family of eleven, he didn't hesitate for even a moment, he said:

"It doesn't matter where we live- here or there we are doing the Rebbe's shlichus. If there are Jews there that need help, that's where we are going. In Hayom Yom we learned "Mi'Hashem mitzadei gever konanu", Hashem sends each person where he needs to be to fulfill his mission in this world."

The shlichus in Phuket will be similiar to the one in China, in that Rabbi Greenberg will be working with the local community. There is a another shliach there, Rabbi **Shalom Glitzenstein**, who caters to the many tourists who visit the area.

Of recent, Phuket has become a refuge of sorts, for many of the foreigners in the surrounding areas who needed to relocate during Covid due to restrictive policies in the locations they were at. In fact, some of the local families are old friends of the Greenbergs from back in Pudong, China.

"The children will continue their same lifestyle as before with the online school. They even have a bonus now that school will be starting at 3 p.m. instead of four, due to the time difference," shared Rabbi Greenberg. "One slight inconvenience is that Pudong is fourteen and a half hours from New York, while Phuket is over twenty."

The parents said that their children could not wait until next year and that they had the most amazing summer experience ever!



As a quarter-million people descend on the Alaska State Fair in Palmer, Alaska, the local shluchim and a group of Lubavitcher bochurim are manning a Chabad pavilion to bring Yiddishkeit to the fairgoers.

As a quarter-million people descend on the annual Alaska State Fair, Chabad is on hand, providing Yiddishkeit for the fairgoers for 14 hours every day.

Held every year in Palmer, Alaska, the Alaska State Fair draws visitors from across the state and many tourists as well. The fair features giant vegetable exhibits, and thousands of exhibits in categories including art, baked goods, canning, clay arts, crops, fiber and fleece, flowers,

handwork and needlework, home brew, honey and bee products, livestock, photography, poultry, quilts, sewing, and woodworking. And now, they feature Chabad as well.

Local shluchim Rabbi **Mendy** and **Chaya Greenberg**, together with a group of bochurim who are studying in the Yeshiva at the Ohel, are manning a Chabad pavilion at the fair from 10:00 AM to 12:00 AM every day, offering the tens of thousands of visitors a chance to put on tefillin, receive an ARK tzedaka box, or just speak about Yiddishkeit.

Each visitor, and especially children, are invited to drop a coin in a "Kindness generator", where they watch how the coin spins its way down and "generates kindness". They then each received a tzedaka box called 'ARK', an acronym for Acts of Routine Kindness. Thus, thousands of adults and children are introduced to the mitzvah of tzedaka, and encouraged to continue it on a regular basis.

The pavilion, which opened this week, will remain open for the entire three weeks of the fair, and thousands of visitors are expected to pass through.

"It is worthwhile to note that the pavilion at the state fair is the only one of its type in all 50 states of America," Rabbi **Yosef Greenberg**, Head Shliach to Alaska, told Anash.org.

### 75 YEARS TO HIS IMPRISONMENT, CHABAD PARLIAMENTARIAN HONORED

In the world's oldest prison, the Russian House of Representatives recognizes the unforgettable Chabad chossid and activist Rabbi Mordechai Dubin, who served as a Member of Parliament in Latvia.

In a moving ceremony, the memorial plaque for the legendary and unforgettable Chassidic "prisoner" Rabbi Mordechai Dubin was unveiled. Rabbi Dubin was both a major spiritual leader and a political leader, who served as a Member of Parliament for the Agudas Israel party while heading the Jewish community in Latvia until 1940. He was instrumental in the release of the Frierdiker Rebbe from prison.

The memorial plaque was arranged after the Chief Rabbi of Russia **Berel Lazar** 

visited the prison last Chanuka and at a meeting with the prison administration told them about Rabbi Dubin who had been incarcerated there for 3 years because of his activities for Russian Jewry. They unanimously decided to commemorate his memory with a plaque, and the Prison Chaplain Rabbi **Ahron Gurevitch** ensured the idea was turned into a reality.

Rabbi Dubin served as a delegate to the House of Representatives in Latvia, and was a very charitable person. With his great spirit and kindness, he worked extensively for the benefit of Russian Jewry. In the First World War, he was able to save thousands of Jews, during the Second World War he was imprisoned in this prison, like so many devoted Chassidim who suffered within these walls that have been working continuously for the past 240 years in the center of Moscow and is known as "Butirsky Prison".

The ceremony was held a few days ago with Prison Chaplain Rabbi Gurevitch, who does so much throughout the year for the benefit of the Jewish prisoners in Russian prisons. Just one example is the establishment of shuls in various prisons enabling the Jewish prisoners to daven, put on Tefilin, attend Torah classes and even farbrengens on special dates in the Jewish calendar.

On behalf of the prison services, a distinguished delegation of representatives participated, led by the Deputy Head of the Federal Correctional Service of Russia in Moscow, Matvey Novikov. The guests gathered in the synagogue located in the southern wing of the prison, along with the Jewish prisoners who were very moved to hear about Rabbi Dubin. They also put on Tefilin and enjoyed the kosher meal provided weekly by Rabbi **Shlomo Dishko**, along with the weekly activities of Rabbi **Yitzchak Zilberg**, who are so dedicated to the wellbeing of the Jewish prisoners.

The schools are each of a different character and the principalship is as varied as the schools they lead. The commonalities are obvious, yet the differences of these schools shape their leadership and the need to interface with school leaders from similar institutions is acutely felt.

The Kinus HaMechanchim presented the opportunity for principals from mosdos with similar objectives to talk shop. Rabbi Lustig led a large group of principals of chadorim. Rabbi Kaplan led a smaller group of day school principal,s and Rabbi Newman led of group of CEOs, who are heads of schools.


The issues raised went to the core of what the mosdos are about and the discussions were lively and dynamic. Rabbi Newman made a PowerPoint presentation about things like budgets, fundraising and teachers' salary scales. The day schools discussed enrolment policies and coordinating curricula, and the chadorim discussed curricula and classroom management issues. They all talked about the recruitment and training of teachers, as well as the retention of seasoned faculty members.

The atmosphere at the 22nd Kinus HaMechanchim was of course the catalyst for the discussions and Rabbi Nochem Kaplan, director of the Merkos Chinuch Office, said at the conclusion of the meetings:

"It's too soon to herald the creation of a new *lgud* of Menahalim, but all the participants agreed to meet a number of times during the course of the year to follow up with a broad plan of cooperative activities".

Rabbonim, *mashpi'im* and tens of locals joined the event, held on Thursday night in the Puppa Hall in Monsey.



After a short boat ride, the Temimim arrived at their destination: The island, Isola Bella, right near the location where the intelligence agents' ship docked for lunch shortly before it sank. On the banks of the lake, with a background of breathtaking scenery and a cloud of sadness, the entire Yeshiva stood for the Siyumei Masechtos.

"We know almost nothing about Agent – M., apart from the first letter of his first name and fragments of descriptions shared by his colleagues. However, we do know this: Here is a person who devoted himself to saving lives literally, in Eretz Israel and in the world, in his life and in his death. While he was here in body – most likely the opportunity would never have arisen for us to thank him, but his neshama is still here, and this is our humble opportunity to finish twenty Masechtos in his memory and thus simply say two words: thank you!", concluded the Rosh Yeshiva Rabbi **Chaim Fieldsteel** with tears.
