WHEN LUBAVITCH PRODUCED CAMPAIGN BUTTONS

For many years, campaign buttons were the go-to method to promote an idea or campaign, and Chabad was no different. Some recently discovered pins and advertisements give a window into fascinating chapters in Chabad history.

In the United States, pin-back buttons were used to promote campaigns or ideas as far back as George Washington. Chabad didn't miss out either, and produced many such pins during its decades on American soil.

Many of those pins were produced, utilized, and lost to history. But a small

number of those pins were recently discovered in the archives of Rabbi **Meir Harlig** *a"h*, and serve as a window into a number of fascinating chapters in Chabad history.

While existing in some form or another since the late 1700s, the use of pin-back buttons became truly widespread in the late 1800s, with the invention of a pin that could be mass-produced more effectively. Over the next years, it became the go-to for political campaigns, advertisements, and even prizes in ceral boxes.

In the 1940s, Chabad created their first buttons, to promote the Mesibas Shabbos program. According to some, the Rebbe, who was then known as the Ramash, wore one such buttons under his jacket. A famous photograph from those years displays R' **Berel Baumgarten** showing one of the first Mesibas Shabbos buttons to the Rebbe.

Over the coming decades, Chabad created many buttons, to promote campaigns, publicize slogans, and spread the word about programs and mivtzoim. While some of those pins were saved in various collections, and others can be found in the Rebbe's library, the vast majority of them were never saved and are lost to history.

Recently, while going through the archives of Rabbi Meir Harlig *a"h*, his son, Rabbi **Shea Harlig**, shliach to Las Vegas, found a number of such buttons, and publicized photos of them. He also discovered a number of other advertisements and campaign materials that were used over the years.

The items include:

Campaign button for the Mihu Yehudi campaign.

From the 1970s until the late 1980s, the Rebbe led the battle to fix the 'Law of Return' in Israel, to only recognize conversions that were performed *al pi halacha*. A campaign pin produced by Chabad declares in English 'Israel must live! Insist on Giyur Kehalacha.'

What is especially interesting is that this was a button in English criticizing a policy of the Israeli government. Seemingly, it was produced for American chassidim to join the struggle to correct the law.

Matchbox with a Mihu Yehudi message

Another popular form of advertising in the 70s and 80s was printing messages on matchboxes, which were then distributed for free. As smoking was rising in popularity, matchboxes were a necessity for many people, and were a effective mode of advertising.

This matchbox was seemingly produced in Eretz Yisroel, as one of the many forms of advertisement and campaigning to correct the law.

Lag B'omer Parade Pin - 5736

A button produced for a 'marshal' at the Lag B'omer parade of 5736. The button has the slogan "Saluting Torah Education", which would indicate that it was a central theme of that year's parade.

Crown Heights Unity

A button promoting peace and harmony in Crown Heights. Showing a white hand and a black hand shaking hands, the pin was most probably produced in the late 1980s or early 1990s, when tensions among the Jewish and Black communities in Crown Heights were rising.

Matza Ball Contest Key Ring

A key ring created as a prize for the Matza Ball contest, which was launched in 5740 at the Rebbe's initiative. The contest heralded a new era of children's programs, including the launch of Tzivos Hashem just a few months later. For more about the contest, **see here**.

When There Were Only Five Mivtzoim

Perhaps the most interesting is an advertisement promoting mivztoim, the Rebbe's mitzvah campaigns. Almost any chossid could tell you that the Rebbe launched 10 mivtzoim, but there was a time when there were less. The mivtzoim were announced over a series of years, and in the interim, there were years with varying numbers of mivtzoim.

The advertisement discovered shows five mitzvah campaigns – Torah Study, Tefillin, Mezuzah, Tzedaka, Jewish Books (Bayis Molei Seforim) and Shabbos and Yom Tov Candles

(Neshek).

The first mivtzah the Rebbe launched was Mivtzah Tefillin in 1967, followed by another four in 1971. The next two, Kashrus and Taharas Hamishpacha, were launched in 1975, so this advertisement was printed sometime between 1971 and 1975.

'AHHHS' AND 'OYS' MAY NOT STAY THE SAME

Reb Yisroel Gordon, *a"h,* used to tell this story:

One winter morning in Russia, a man took his son to the *mikveh* with him. They broke a hole in the icy layer on top of the lake and the father helped his son safely into the water. "Oy!" the boy screamed as he hit the freezing water. When he came out,

and his father wrapped him in a warm blanket and he gave a deep contented sigh of relief, "Ahh."

As they rode home, the father said: "Son, life is full of oys and ahhhs; the question is only the order in which they come. Usually, doing the right thing is difficult, it's an 'Oy.' But as time passes and we see the benefit, we can finally say, 'Ahhh.' Conversely, doing the wrong thing is usually easy and enjoyable at first; we give an immediate gratifying 'Ahhh.' But as time passes, that 'Ahhh' turns into a regretful 'Oy."'

Our *sedrah* opens with, "Behold, I set before you today a blessing and a curse. The blessing, if you will heed the commandments of Hashem, your G-d, which I command you today; and the curse, if you will not heed the commandments of Hashem your G-d."

The *medrash* explains these *pesukim* with a *mashal*. An old man sat at a crossroad announcing: There are two paths, one is smooth in the beginning but thorny at the end, and the other is thorny at the beginning but smooth later on.

This is what Hashem is telling the Yidden: Finding the right path in life is tricky. Many paths seem good and smooth, but ultimately they'll lead us in the wrong direction. The Torah's path is not always the easiest nor the smoothest, but it's guaranteed to lead us to ultimate goodness. I am the One telling you what's a blessing and what's a curse. Judge only by what I command you, not by what appears to be true.

Someone once wrote a letter to the Rebbe saying that he plans to move his young child from a *cheder* that has a high standard of *Yiras Shamayim* (but the physical air in the room isn't good) to a school that has lower *Yiras Shamayim* (but it has better, cleaner air). Once the child gets healthier, he assured the Rebbe, he'll bring him back to the first *cheder*. The Rebbe responded that he doesn't approve of this, and quoted the *passuk*, *"Yiras Hashem l'chaim," Yiras Hashem* is ultimately what brings life, also in the very physical sense.[1]

There has never been a more confusing time than ours. We are exposed to endless information on how to live our lives; choose priorities; educate our children; and be married. A lot of the information seems sound, practical, and is even proven to work. But we need to be open to the possibility that these are the ahhhs that may one day prove to be oys.

We're lucky to have Torah as our guide to the ultimate ahhs.

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MY EMOTIONAL MOMENT AT THE KOSEL THIS PAST WEEK

Article by Rabbi Mendel Greisman: I was standing at the Kosel, surrounded by many thousands of fellow chassidim, dressed in Shabbos clothes. Here's why it was incredibly inspiring, and what it meant to me.

I have just gotten back to Arkansas from a quick visit to Eretz Yisroel, where I had the incredible zchus to participate in the Siyum of the 8th Children's Sefer Torah.

If you don't know me, my father, R' **Shmuel Greisman**, was appointed in

5741, just a few days after the launch of

Mivtzah Oís BiSefer Torah to run the Va'ad

of the Children's Sefer Torah with all that it

entails: Manage the office, send out the certificates, arrange the actual writing and of course organize the actual Siyum.

As my father's son, this Mivtzah has been part of my life for as long as I can remember. There were always forms, certificates, publications and conversations about the Sefer Torah campaign in our home; and until this day, I will routinely help out with something that needs to be done. Yet, for whatever reason, I was not able to attend any Siyum since 5746 and this was my first time at a Siyum in 37 years.

A lot has been said and written about this Mivtzah since the <u>renewed hisorerus</u> to finish it in Shnas Hakhel, and I'm sure you saw the pictures and read the <u>coverage of the</u> incredible Siyum celebration at the Kosel. I would like to share with you a thought that has been on my mind over the last few days, one I couldn't stop thinking about.

I was standing at the Kosel, surrounded by many thousands of fellow Chasidim. The majority of them were dressed in Bigdei Shabbos and it was obvious that everyone felt a part of the Simcha, it was 'their' Simcha.

I can't think past the amazing "Hu Bachayim" moment that took place over here. Think about it: Forty-two years after the campaign was started, close to thirty years since Gimmel Tammuz, and thousands upon thousands of chassidim – most of whom were born long after this Mivtzah has started – feel that the Siyum of this Sefer Torah is **their** Simcha – only because this was something that is dear to the Rebbe. No one forced them to come and

stand for hours in the summer heat. They felt that this was something they **wanted** to do and somewhere they wanted to be, because as Chassidim, what is dear to their Rebbe is dear to them.

But what is so special about **this** particular Mivtzah that has brought out such a powerful show of Hiskashrus in such a beautiful way? We're always involved in the Rebbe's activities, yet such a show of Hiskashrus and achdus is rarely seen. What is the uniqueness of this Mivtzah?

What follows are my feelings only, and I share them with you with the hopes that you will be inspired as well.

I believe that there is something unique about this Mivtzah that we don't find, at least overtly, in most other mivtzoim.

This Mivtzah is unique because it is 'Kuloi Rebbe'. The Rebbe didn't just pick something we should learn or a Mitzvah we should focus on; in this Mivtzah – the idea, the initiative, the execution, the design and the process were all done entirely by the Rebbe. The Rebbe's involvement in this Sefer Torah campaign during its formative months – and the years that followed – was down to the detail in every part of the campaign. He told us how it should be done, where it should be written, how to buy the letters, what pictures should be on the certificate and he even drew out the design of the Mantle in his holy handwriting. And this is just a short sample of the many instructions of the Rebbe, some of which are detailed in the beautiful album that was published about this campaign a few years ago.

I don't claim to know everything, but I cannot recall another Mivtzah where the Rebbe was involved with such a level of detail.

Did you know that the Rebbe wanted a report **every single Friday** from Pesach 5741 onwards, how many children were registered in the Sefer Torah, down to the individual child?

The Rebbe has invested so much of himself into this Mivtzah and perhaps this is why this Mivtzah was able to bring out such a unity amongst Anash and such a strong show of Hiskasrush, the likes of which we don't see too often these days.

As my father's son, I see firsthand how meticulously and how carefully every detail of the Rebbe's instructions and horo'os are carried out to this day. It is no surprise that a Mivtzah that is *Kuloi Rebbe* has brought out such a thirst and yearning amongst the Chassidim. I can only imagine how much *Nachas* the Rebbe will have when these eight Sifrei Torah will be there, right outside the Har Habayis, when Moshiach comes speedily in our days.

On a practical note: One of the horo'os the Rebbe gave – that is carried out until this very day – is that each child should pay just one dollar for their letter. Even back then, the Rebbe said that the cost of the writing, correspondence, certificates and postage is at least two or

three times that amount and you can only imagine what the costs are – per letter – 42 years later. Let me just say that the postage alone for mailing the certificate is often more than one dollar. Nevertheless, the Rebbe's words are kept and the price remains one dollar to this day, necessitating the need for the va'ad to fundraise the remaining expenses to be able to carry out this campaign as the Rebbe wanted.

In the days leading up to the 2nd Siyum, the Rebbe requested that every chossid should participate in the Siyum physically, and if they cannot attend, they should support it financially. A campaign is underway to help raise the needed funds to cover the expenses of the Siyum and the mailing of the tens of thousands of certificates for the children that registered in the last few months. THE REBBE'S GRANDSON WHO WAS CHALLENGED WITH FASHION

grandfather, the Alter Rebbe, who tried
to discourage him from getting fitted
with a collar of the latest fashion, and
promised him Gan Eden – but only if he
really meant it.

Reb Menachem Nochum, the oldest son of the Mitteler Rebbe, was born around the year 5547 (1787) and resided in Lubavitch. Later on, he moved to Niezhin, making frequent extended visits to the kever of his grandfather the Alter Rebbe in Haditch. He passed away around eighty years old and is buried in Niezhin.

During the time of the Alter Rebbe, a new fashion in Russia dictated that jackets should henceforth have collars. When his grandson Reb Nochum, son of the Mitteler Rebbe, was preparing for his *chassuna*, the Alter Rebbe called for him and asked him about his silk *kapota*: would it be made in the traditional way, or would it conform to the new fashion? "It'll have a collar, of course," Reb Nochum replied.

The Alter Rebbe requested that he have it made without one, but Reb Nochum, then still a young *bochur*, argued, "Everyone else will have one, and I'll be embarrassed." The Alter Rebbe then promised him that if he wore a *kapota* without a collar, he would be together with his grandfather in Gan Eden. He then asked Reb Nochum that when his *kapota* was ready, he should come to him dressed in it. Reb Nochum asked if he must do it wholeheartedly or *kabolas ol* would be sufficient. The Alter Rebbe replied, "Of course, it must be truthfully, and with the truth of the *'yechida*." Reb Nochum was silent and nothing more was said.

Before the *chassuna*, the young man entered the Alter Rebbe's room, dressed in his new *kapota...* which had a collar. The Alter Rebbe then tore off a small piece of fur from the inside of the coat and promised him long life for that. Years later Reb Nochum commented, "I was young and didn't appreciate how great was the promise I had been given." To correct this incident, Reb Nochum would spend much time in Haditch by the Ohel of the Alter Rebbe.

The Rebbe explained that at that time and place, the challenge of fashion was extremely difficult. Had the Alter Rebbe been successful, that challenge would have been removed for generations to come. And that explains why he offered his grandson such a rich reward.

The Mitteler Rebbe's *kapelia* included two groups of chassidim, musicians and horse riders, who would enliven joyous occasions. The Rebbe's son Reb Nachum was one of the horse riders.

One ordinary day, the Rebbe called for a performance and stood by his window to watch. Suddenly, Reb Nachum was flung from his horse and was badly hurt, but surprisingly, the Rebbe motioned that the performance should continue. Meanwhile, a doctor was called, and after examining Reb Nachum, concluded, "He has only broken his leg."

Some chassidim later asked the Mitteler Rebbe why he had ordered that the performance continue, despite the accident.

"Why don't you ask the reason for calling for a performance on a regular day?" responded the Rebbe, and he explained: "I became aware of a harsh decree being issued in *Shamayim* on my son, and since *simcha* sweetens stern decrees, I called for the *kapelia*. The *simcha* helped, for his fall turned out much less harmful than what had been planned for him. Then, to ensure a complete recovery, I instructed that the festivities continue. With *HaShem's* help, he will recover completely."

Year after year, as if for the first time, Reb Nachum, the Alter Rebbe's grandson, would relate in patient detail all the events that took place during the stormy time of the Alter Rebbe's arrest.

He would describe the tense atmosphere of that period, the libelous accusation the *misnagdim* brought to the czarist authorities, and their exultation when the Alter Rebbe was arrested. Reb Nachum would then describe the Alter Rebbe's stay in prison, his *geula*, the way in which the good news spread, and the Rebbe's return trip to Liozna from the prison in Petersburg.

When he recalled the arrest, his voice would drop, as if he were weeping; when he described the liberation, his voice would rise with the *simcha* of a remembered victory.

Like the Megilla Reading on Purim, he would tell the whole story once at night and again by day. Moreover, if one of the dignified elder chassidim would join the gathering after he had begun, he would go back to the very beginning and start all over again!

SCHOLAR PUBLISHES COMMENTARY ON HILCHOS ROSH HASHANA

Chabad scholar and author Rabbi Berel Levine published a new volume of his Divrei Shalom commentary on the Alter Rebbe's Shulchan Aruch, covering the laws of Rosh Hashanah. Download here.

As Elul begins, and with it, the preparations for Rosh Hashanah, a new commentary on Hilchos Rosh Hashanah in the Alter Rebbe's Shulchan Aruch was published and released online.

The new publication is the newest volume in the 'Divrei Shalom' series on the Alter Rebbe's Shulchan Aruch, authored by Chabad scholar Rabbi **Berel Levine**, Chief

Librarian of the Rebbe's library, editor of the new edition of the Alter Rebbe's Shulchan Aruch, and author of numerous seforim.

Rabbi Levine previously published six volumes of Divrei Shalom on the Alter Rebbe's Hilchos Pesach and eight on Hilchos Shabbos.

After completing the latter set, Rabbi Levine told Anash.org that he "hopes to continue and write the commentary on the entire Alter Rebbe's Shulchan Aruch." That hope started actualizing with the release of the newest volume.

The 'Divrei Shalom' commentary was written to make it accessible to every learner to truly understand the halacha written in the Shulchan Aruch, and to also give a wider understanding by seeing the sources from where it was drawn.

Inside the text of the Shulchan Aruch Rabbi Levine added punctuation, divided the *sei'ifim* into sections, and added headings to the *sei'ifim*. In the more complicated *halachos*, he added a summary of the topic in the footnotes.

The sources where the Alter Rebbe drew the Halacha are all quoted, at least in brief, starting from the Gemara and continuing through the *poskim*, Rishonim and Acharonim. In places where it seems that there is a contradiction in the Alter Rebbe's words from one

halacha to another, Rabbi Levine added an possible explanation, as well as noting where others discuss these topics.

A focal point of the commentary is to stress the *chiddushim* of the Alter Rebbe, which can be easily missed because they are written in a very condensed manner.

The newest volume, covering the entire Hilchos Rosh Hashanah, was not yet printed by Kehos, but is being made available in PDF format by the author for readers of Anash.org, to allow them to delve into Hilchos Rosh Hashanah before Yom Tov arrives.

"As it is a preliminary edition, I ask that if anyone has any corrections or comments to be please contact me at library@chabad.org," Rabbi Levine said.

CHABAD WON'T BACK DOWN AFTER HORRIFIC "GAS CHAMBER" THREATS

Threats of annihilation didn't cause Shliach Rabbi Shlomo Litvin to cower in fear. In fact, it did just the opposite: He announced a brand new building campaign in the works.

Last week, the Jewish Center for Students serving the University of Kentucky, was assailed with multiple anti-Semitic and violent threats. Instead of cowering in fear, the Chabad Rabbi and Jewish community have forged full-force ahead in their next campaign to build a permanent center for their activities.

Rabbi **Shlomo Litvin**, the shliach on campus of the University of Kentucky, is

no stranger to threats directed at him. As the main public Jewish figure in his area, he is a direct target for assaults for anyone looking to target a known Jewish icon.

Rabbi Litvin serves on the board of the Kentucky Human Rights Commission, advises the legislative and executive branches regarding any Jewish affairs, and is the chaplain in the State House. He also is the current chairman of the Kentucky Jewish Council which is the leading Jewish organization and voice in Kentucky.

Being in such a prominent position, unfortunately makes him an often target for anti-Semitic threats, so when the Chabad text service answering machine started beeping with vitriolic messages, he wasn't surprised, but he was immediately alarmed.

"The trouble about theses messages, was the operative terms they were using. In the Thursday message, there were references to mapping out the Chabad Center. I contacted the police immediately on Thursday. On Shabbos, the texts started threatening to blow up the Student Center- they referenced gas chambers and extermination. On Motzei Shabbos we were barraged with even more aggressive messages."

The local police force and detectives were instantly responsive and took the matter seriously immediately. Detectives tracked the message system and were led to a former

university employee by the name of Sendil Nathan who was found Sunday morning and apprehended and arrested that afternoon.

Many leaders and politicians reached out in support of Chabad and made statements but the University has remained suspiciously silent, even publishing a statement distancing themselves from the Jewish Center, with the representative of UK even stating:

"As the Chabad Center is not affiliated with the institution, and is located off campus, our understanding is that Lexington police are investigating."

Rabbi Litvin and the university students are understandably indignant and disappointed at the lack of responsibility being taken by the University of Kentucky in defending their Jewish students, especially that the aggressor is a former employee of theirs.

"My Zaidy was arrested in Ukraine for learning Torah. In history we see a pattern that we can never trust the government to protect us. That is, up until we came to America- which the Rebbe calls a *medina shel chessed*, a country of kindness.

"The Rebbe, who survived Bolshevik Russia, Nazi invasion, knew firsthand of governments who let their Jewish citizens die and actively pursued them. When the Rebbe came to America, he said that the government here is different and we can clearly see it," shares Rabbi Litvin.

The students of UK attend a daily Chitas *shiur* that Rabbi Litvin holds. That day, right before the *shiur*, he briefed the students about what was going on with the onslaught of threats directed at Chabad, and how the police were involved and taking care of the matter.

In an amazing case of Hashgacha Pratis, the first *possuk* in the Chumash of that day was "*Shoftim, v'shotrim titen licha...*" "You should appoint judges and police to enforce laws in all the cities." Without law enforcement, things would be chaotic all around.

"Right away, the detectives took my call and got on the case. Within three days they found the guilty party and had him arrested- it's the university that clearly chose to be ignorant and hateful about the matter. We see a rising trend of anti-Semitic attacks in America nowadays and we need to stand up to it," says Rabbi Litvin emphatically.

The best was to stand up to anti-Semitism is by growing stronger and prouder in our *Yiddisheit*. The Chabad of UK will be doing that in a massive way now, with the announcement of a new building they will be purchasing for hosting all of the Jewish activities.

"The plans for the new building was in the making for a long while, and was going to have its debut announced at our annual student barbeque. We hold it as an orientation for the new students, and a welcome back to the old ones.

"This year, the event will be held on this coming Sunday, but in light of recent events, we announced the exciting plans earlier to boost the morale of the students and community

members," says Rabbi Litvin. "We fight darkness with light, and evil with goodness."

The current Chabad house has many limits on the security available because drilling cameras in a leased property is not allowed, and there are multiple other obstacles in the way of having a proper surveillance system installed.

The new building will have a high tech security system that was not in the previous facility. Now, the building will be equipped with 24/7 surveillance cameras and fiber optic technology, with a security room that will keep a pulse on the happenings at all times.

"We announced our new building GoFundMe that we are holding for the next two weeks. All of the donations will be tripled by our generous friends who are partnering up to make this dream happen for the Jewish community of Bluegrass, Kentucky," says Rabbi Litvin.

The new Jewish Student Center will be large enough to host the multiple classes, programs, and lectures for the community and the university students as well. Jewish families from around are so hopeful and grateful to see Chabad taking the lead and proudly stepping up in this harrowing time.

At a time when most people would take a step down and try to attract less attention, Chabad of Bluegrass is taking the opportunity to grow even bigger and better and refuses to back down to those that threaten or try to intimidate the Jewish people.

"So, I asked the agent if he would be willing, but he said it would be impossible since he was the only one there."

"My wife drew inspiration from Mushi Fogelman's narrative and said, 'It's my birthday, and I am going to the Rebbe's Ohel. I need something good to bring The Rebbe.' The most amazing thing happened – he said, 'OK, let's do it."

Twenty-three years after they were the founding group of the Budapest Yeshiva, five classmates from around the world gathered for a reunion.

The bochurim who served as shluchim in the Budapest Yeshiva gathered for a reunion. Rabbis Yochanan Posner, Naftoli Marrus, Meir Moscowitz, Shlomo Rapoport and Shmuel Slavin who were joined local Rabbi Shlomo Koves for a Shabbos Hakhel reunion. The Shabbaton

was held in honor of *shnas hakhel*, to reunite in the place where they once studied and taught together.

The Budapest Yeshiva was founded by Rabbi **Baruch Oberlander** in 1998 within the building of the Vasvári Pál Street Synagogue in Budapest. This location had previously housed a yeshiva in the 1940s after World War II. The students of the yeshiva had a dual purpose: to continue their rabbinical studies and also to contribute to the Jewish community's life by teaching, participating in programs, and establishing connections with Jews who had become disconnected from their roots.

The group heard *shiurim* from their beloved Rosh Yeshiva, head shliach Rabbi Baruch Oberlander and spent Shabbos with the community including with many whose involvement in Yidishkeit is a direct result of the efforts some 23 years ago.

"The Budapest Yeshiva helped Chabad Lubavitch open up to a broader segment of the community," Rabbi Oberlander shared during the class reunion. "The Friday night Shabbos meal was very moving, as those who attended, who had been at Vasvári around the turn of the millennium, recalled how the students helped them discover their roots and shape their Jewish identity. This identity continues to accompany them and has led them to have their own Jewish families, raising their children in a Jewish spirit."

Chazzan Naftoli Marrus inspired the shul with his davening. The group had the opportunity to visit some of the many new and renewed shuls, schools, kosher establishments and institutions led by their chaver, Chief Rabbi Shlomo Koves.

Rabbi Koves warmly welcomed his old friends and proudly showcased the developments of the past 23 years.

"Some of us hadn't seen each other in twenty years, yet we could continue our conversations as if we had met yesterday," the rabbi explained. "Regarding the community, it was heartening to hear from them how much has changed, how much Jewish life has developed. When you see things day by day, you don't feel the growth as strongly, so receiving this feedback from those who haven't been here for more than twenty years is very rewarding."

Each of the Talmidim Hashluchim of the Budapest Yeshiva are remembered dearly by Budapest Jewry for their individual contributions to the overall impact of the Yeshiva. Especially noteworthy is Rabbi **Shmulik Raskin** who came to Budapest as a bachur and never left, and today serves as the Rabbi of the Israeli community in Hungary and director of Keren-Or Chabad Israeli Center of Budapest.

The impact of the Budapest Yeshiva is still felt in Jewish life, according to Rabbi Koves: "Many aspects of Jewish practice today are based on the Budapest Yeshiva—for example, the Friday evening kiddush, which is now present in all synagogues, originated from Vasvári, just like the *nusach* and the songs we sing. The Shabbos Table Companion and many other publications was compiled by one of the returning students, Rabbi Yochanan Posner. The impact of that year was profound on our lives".

UKRAINIAN SOLDIER RECITES HAGOMEL IN THANKS FOR MIRACULOUS RESCUE

Ruslan, a Jewish soldier from Kiev, fought fiercely but almost lost his life in the minefield in the Donbas region. While recovering in a hospital, he had the privilege of putting on Tefillin with the chief rabbi of Kiev, Rabbi **Yonasan Markowitz**, and recites 'Bricas HaGomel', thanking Hashem for his survival.

When Rabbi Markowitz received a phone call from Ruslan, he did not imagine the situation that the man on the other line

was. Ruslan has lived in Kyiv for 30 years and knew Rabbi Markowitz quite well, as the Rabbi who serves as a Chabad Shliach in the city and is chief rabbi of Kyiv.

While he is no longer in his twenties, Ruslan still wanted to join the war to bring peace and quiet to the people of Ukraine. Last summer he joined the army and was sent to fight in different places. "I was in Chernigov after the Russians fled, and I cleaned the area of the mines and bombs they left" says Ruslan.

"Last winter I was sent to the Donbass region to fight at the front line, after a tremendous effort, when the Russians are close to us, we managed to release some areas from the hands of the enemy".

The liberated areas contained mines and explosives, and the soldiers had to risk their lives to clean the areas. "Since I know the area with eyes closed, I was chosen to lead the soldiers and I helped them clean the area" Ruslan said. "The missiles, mines and the fact that these are areas of forests, made the operation extremely dangerous. Many of my friends were evacuated with serious injuries".

After a few months Ruslan tragically lost his leg, after one of the operations during which he stepped on a mine, and became seriously wounded. The rescue effort was not easy, and after his close friends risked their lives entering the minefield, Ruslan was miraculously saved and taken to the hospital where he suffered serious injuries to his head and back.

When Rabbi Markowitz came to visit him for the first time at the hospital, he saw that Ruslan's leg had been amputated. Ruslan asked to pray and thank G-d for staying alive despite the unthinkable injury.

"It was an emotional situation" Rabbi Markowitz describes those moments over the wounded soldier's bed. "Ruslan is a heroic Jew who gave his life to protect his homeland, his family and his brothers. When tefillin were on his head, he said the bracha of Hagomel for being able to return to his family and receiving his life as a gift".

The Chabad JCC community in Kyiv is in contact with many soldiers serving on the front lines of the war, giving them love and taking care of their needs, and also of their spiritual needs. Every holiday eve, the soldiers receive deliveries of kosher food, Tefillin, prayer books, cloth packages and any need.

WAS THE WORLD'S OLDEST SHUL JUST FOUND IN RUSSIA?

During excavations conducted in the antique city of Phanagoria, Russia archaeologists from the Russian Academy of Science found traces of an ancient Shul estimated to be from the time of the second Bais Hamikdash.

During excavations conducted by archaeologists in the antique city of Phanagoria on the Taman Peninsula in the territory of the city of Krasnodar, located in Russia in the area of the Azov Sea from the south of the Black Sea, the analysis of the fragments of the preserved decoration allows us to conclude that the synagogue was erected at the turn of the millennium and existed for at least 500 years.

With the support of Russian billionaire

Oleg Deripaska's Volnoe Delo Foundation, archaeologists from the Russian Academy of Science who are exploring remains from the city, have found traces of the synagogue's foundations and walls off Russia's Taman Peninsula.

Inside the rectangular structure, which is 21 m deep and 6 m wide, were several menorahs, altars, fragments of marble steles, The team also found tablets with dates from the first century.

The place contains a complex of two rooms, each with an area of more than 60 square meters, it is characterized by rich decorations on its painted walls, and its roof was covered with tiles. The Jewish marble that were found are unique and different from those in Israel.

As mentioned according to the researchers, the synagogue was built in the era of the Second Bais Hamikdash. The researchers noted that few synagogues functioned during the Second Bais Hamikdash, and were built by representatives of the diaspora who lived far from Jerusalem. According to what is known, the first synagogues date back to the 3rd century, and their construction flourished only in the 3rd century, therefore this synagogue that was discovered Now, it is one of the oldest in the world.

Inside the rectangular structure 21 meters deep and 6 meters wide were several menorahs, altars, fragments of marble steles, including one bearing the word synagogue in the original

Ancient Greek. The team also came upon tablets with dates from the first century.

The structure has features characteristic of the Second Bais Hamikdash period, of Jewish history and likely remained standing until the middle of the sixth century, when Phanagoria was sacked and burned by barbarian tribes.

In the large Jewish community that exists today in the nearby city of Krasnodar, the news was received with excitement feelings, knowing that they are continuing a tradition that is thousands of years old, and despite the difficult times that Russia has gone through, the community is flourishing with thousands of Jewish families.

A delegation from the community, led by the rabbi of the city, Rabbi **Menachem Mendel Lazar**, is expected to visit the site in the coming days, at the invitation of the archaeological authority, which is interested in cooperation in order to get to the bottom of the discoveries of this interesting piece of history, that was found throughout Russia.

GROUNDBREAKING HELD FOR MIKVAH MEI PESYA LEAH IN MISSOURI

A year and a half ago, the worldwide Chabad community united to raise funds to build a mikvah in memory of Mrs. **Pesya Leah Lapine** *hy"d*. Just recently, a groundbreaking was held, heralding the start of the final steps before the mikvah goes up.

The campaign was launched in Shevat of 5782, ahead of the 30th anniversary of the

brutal murder of Mrs. Lapine. Her son, shliach Rabbi **Avraham Lapine**, together with his family, decided that the best way to honor their mother would be to establish a Mikvah in her memory.

After many long months of preparations, including obtaining permits, creating architectural plans, and more, the long-awaited groundbreaking for the Mikvah Mei Pesya Leah in Columbia, Missouri, was held on Sunday, July 30th, 12 Menachem Av.

The new facility will have a design inspired by 770 and will contain a full Mikvah, named Mikvah Pesya Leah, after Mrs. Lapine. The planning of the mikvah was overseen by renowned mikvah expert Rabbi **Gershon Grossbaum**.

Many dozens of local community members, along with members of my family and friends, all joined together to symbolically break ground to begin construction. It was over 90 degrees outside, so they gathered in a tent on the exact site of the new construction, with a misting fan to help keep cool.

Addressing the crowd was Rabbi Avraham Lapine, who spoke about how this new Mikvah will complete the Jewish community of Columbia, for the Mikvah is the cornerstone of Jewish living. Rabbi **Yoisef Simmonds** of Crown Heights, a brother-in-law of Rabbi Lapine,

led the assembly in Tehilim. Reb **Chaim Dovid Lapine**, father of Rabbi Lapine, also spoke, as well as other family members. Members of the local community also spoke.

The formal part of the program was followed by a brunch with a bounce house and snow cones for kids, and Tefilin for the men.

Guests from St. Louis included Rabbis **Yosef Landa**, Rabbi **Hershey Novack**, and Rabbi **Chaim Landa**. A delegation from Overland Park KS, also participated, including Mrs. Pesya Leah Lapine's mother-in-law, Mrs. **Janice Lapine** *shetichye*.

Rabbi Lapine thanked the supporters from Missouri and from around the world who joined together to help bring the project to fruition.

Rabbi **Yitzchok Goldstein**, shliach of the Rebbe to Madrid, Spain since the year 5738, with the direct and personal encouragement of the Rebbe, passed away.

He was 72 years old, and had battled a terrible illness in recent years.

He was born in 5712 in Crown Heights to his parents, Rabbi **Yosef (Uncle Yossi)** and

Chana Priva Goldstein, daughter of Reb **Alter Yehoshua Hacohen Winter**. During the years 5732-5733, he served as a bochur shliach to the Yeshiva in London.

In 5735, he married **Shifra Greenberg** of Crown Heights and soon after they began their life on shlichus, first in Upstate New York's Catskills region in such towns as Woodridge and Monticello.

In 5737, Rabbi & Mrs. Goldstein were asked by the Rebbe's European ambassador Rabbi **Avrohom Yitzchok Glick** to come to Malaga, Spain to open a Kosher Mikvah. Soon after, immediately after Pesach of 5738, they moved to the capital Madrid and established a Chabad center there. Over the following years, thousands of locals and visitors were the beneficiaries of their great caring and devotion. There they raised a large family, *ka"h*, many of whom are on shlichus today.

Rabbi Goldstein was known as a great *mekusher* to the Rebbe who frequently wrote to the Rebbe how great his desire was to be in the Rebbe's *daled amos*. The Rebbe responded in kind, giving Rabbi Goldstein unique direction and encouragement in his shlichus and work.

In one such example, in an answer written on Erev Rosh Chodesh Elul 5742, exactly 41 years ago to the day, the Rebbe responded to a letter of Rabbi Goldstein where he begged permission to be by the Rebbe for Tishrei.

In his letter, Rabbi Goldstein wrote that "Although we do not have money [for the trip]...but if the Torah was concerned about the money of Yidden, surely for their *neshamos* and the *chayos* they receive from being in the Rebbe's presence."

The Rebbe circled the words "neshamos", and wrote "How do they know where is better for your neshama [to be]?"

In Rabbi Goldstein's letter, he continued: "We want to be by the Rebbe *shlita*, please!" The Rebbe circled that line, and wrote "The Baal Shem Tov says, that when a Yid thinks about Madrid, he is in Madrid." This is referring to the teaching of the Baal Shem Tov "Where a person's thoughts are, that's where he is." The Rebbe was telling his dedicated shluchim that he was with them in Madrid...

HARAV CHAI YITZCHOK TWERSKY, RACHMASTRIVKA REBBE OF BORO PARK, 92

Harav Chai Yitzchok Twersky, the Rachmastrivka Rebbe of Boro Park, the most elder Admur of the generation, who had a unique *yechidus* with the Rebbe before his wedding, passed away.

Harav **Chai Yitzchok Twersky**, the Rachmastrivka Rebbe of Boro Park, the most elder Admur of the generation, who was renowned across the globe, passed away.

He was 92 years old.

Born in Yerushalyim to his father Harav **Yochanon Twersky**, then son of the

Rachmastrivka Rebbe **Harav Dovid Twersky**, and **Esther Rivkah (Wilhelm)** in 5691 (1931). He was an great-grandson of Harav **Yisroel Shimon Shain** of Yerushalayim, a Lubavitcher chossid from Mohilev, Russia, who settled in Yerushalayim in 5630 – 1870.

After a childhood illness that almost took his life, he miraculously recovered and has the name Chai added to his name. Rav Chai Yitzchok later married the daughter of Harav **Yakov Yosef Twersky of Skver** in 5714 – 1954 and settled in New York. Before his *chasunah* he merited to have a lengthy *yechidus* with the Rebbe, the details of which he repeated to his nephew, Rabbi **Nachman Yosef Twersky** of Crown Heights. *(See video below.)*

Reb Chai Yitzchok was accompained by his father Reb Yochanan, whom knew the Rebbe from his youth, when he had been involved in an underground cheder in Nikolayev.

At the yechidus the Rebbe mentioned a particular student from that cheder who had since immigrated to the United States, where he left the path of Torah. The Rebbe added that Lubavitcher chassidim had tried to bring him back but to no avail, and perhaps he would be able to influence him. Then and there, the Rebbe picked up the phone and dialed the man's number. "I have Rabbi Yochanan Twersky sitting here. Do you remember him? He is interested in meeting with you. When can you meet?"

On Friday afternoon, as arranged, the former student and the Rachmistrivka Rebbe met, and after exchanging reminiscences, the man offered him a generous check. To his surprise, the Rachmistrivka Rebbe declared, "I won't accept a check until we discuss your Yiddishkeit." The man protested that he was a respected member of his Jewish community and even went to shul occasionally. However, it soon became apparent that he did not observe even the basics of Yiddishkeit.

Reb Yochanan's eyes filled with tears. "Was it for a 'Yiddishkeit' like this that we invested so much effort in you in the chadorim in Nikolayev? Each of your teachers put his life in danger – and for what? So you would grow up to be a yerei Shamayim and a frum Yid. Just look how far you've strayed" The man was moved, and resolved to do teshuva and begin observing mitzvos.

He again tried to present the check, but again Reb Yochanan insisted: "I will accept it only after I find out that you have kept your word and have done teshuva. And how will I know when I don't live here?" He then answered his own question, "When the Lubavitcher Rebbe tells me that you did teshuva, only then will I accept your donation."

During his remaining few weeks in New York, the Rachmistrivka Rebbe received many people who came to him for brachos and advice. One day, the phone rang at his host's house and the Rachmistrivka Rebbetzin answered. The voice on the line asked to speak with Rabbi Twersky.

"Who's speaking?" she asked. "Doh ret-men fun Lubavitch (I'm calling from Lubavitch)." Realizing it was the Lubavitcher Rebbe, she excitedly gave the phone to her husband, who was happy to hear the Rebbe's update: their former student had indeed begun to observe mitzvos.

"Reb Yochanan," the Rebbe added, "you think you came here in order to marry off your son? You came here so that a Yid would do teshuva. Now this man is frum!"

In 5742 – 1982, after the passing of his father, the Rachmastrivka Rebbe, he was appointed as the Rebbe in New York despite adamantly not wanting to. He later opened a shul on 45th Street in Boro Park. Over the years his shul and mosdos attracted many thousands to his simple and sincere *derech* in *avodas* Hashem.

Rav Itzikel, as he was known, kept in close contact with his cousins the Wilhelm family from Eretz Yisroel and Crown Heights, joining their simchas and often even wearing his bigdei Shabbos to the weddings.

In recent years he had become weak, until he passed away today, Erev Rosh Chodesh Elul, 5 days before his 92nd birthday.

The Levaya will take place today, Wednesday, in Boro Park with *kevurah* the Har Shalom cemetery in Airmont (Monsey).

She was 97 years old.

Born Esther Leah Leibowicz, in the shtetl

of Kal'nyk, 16km from Munkacs (today in Ukraine), in 1926. As an older teenager, she went to join her 3 older siblings in Budapest. When the Nazis arrived in Budapest a short while later, her siblings urged her to get the train back home. During the journey, she was arrested by the SS. Her parents and younger siblings were all murdered.

Through the clear hand of Hashem, she survived the horrors of Auschwitz and the notorious Death March out of that evil place.

After the war, she met her husband, **Sender Engel**, in a DP camp in Germany. Her aunt and two sisters, who had also survived, went fishing and returned with a small bucket of tiny fish, from which they made one roll of Gefilta fish – which served as their wedding feast. The whole DP camp population joined the dancing.

Her husband, Sender, never fully recovered from his experiences in the camps, passing away in his mid-30s, leaving her widowed with two young children, for whom she worked to provide for their needs.

After her children married, she herself remarried Mr. **Moshe Einhorn**. At the age of 78, after Mr. Einhorn passed away, she retired from her job at 'Mauzone', a kosher deli in Lawrence, NY, and moved to Eretz Yisroel, joining her daughter and son-in-law Frumie and Shmuel Siegel, in Kfar Maimon.

She was an amazing woman who, despite her difficult hardships, lived her 97 years to the absolute fullest.

In the later years of her life, she took great pleasure in her *nachas*, daily reviewing the names of her over 100 direct descendants, and *kveld* in their visits and phone calls.

She maintained a unique positivity and optimism and possessed a true *simchas hachai*m – joy in life. She had a special *'chein'* and a great sense of humor and was loved by all who knew her.


